Berwick Clip and Climb Night



In the heaviest rain we've seen in a long time, Cubs poured into the Berwick Clip and Climb for a district night. The wet


weather didn't dampen anyone's spirits the noise and enthusiasm generated by so many Cubs was quite amazing!

Another favourite was the "Face to Face" wall - a clear perspex wall with a climb on each side of it. Friends delighted by racing each other on this climb.






This week, with thanks to Tim, Ben and Ken, some new racking was erected in the Q Store annex.

This was a several stage process involving moving all of the timber and loose items into the main hall as a first step. Then the following day half the carpet and underlay in the Q store annex was removed. This



also required the manual removal of loads of nails and staples.

The racking was then able to be erected against the wall. The

new racking measures 1.2m deep x 4.0m long x 2.4m high.

This provides some muchneeded shelf space as well as making storing our equipment and using the Q store annex somewhat safer.

Thanks a lot for your efforts, gentlemen.




Painting the Hall


