With Old Baloo (Ken - Asst. group Leader) as Leader in Charge, Akela (Judith- Cub Leader) on first aid and Joey welfare and



A very hurried pack up and departure had the whole camp evacuated of all 300 odd Scouts plus leaders/parent helpers. up, BMX riding, a Hot Lap in one of the 5-6 Rover Mud Bash cars, and a Junior Development Program where the scouts actually got to drive a car under the instruction of the Rovers around an obstacle course, and various other activities.

Each activity had a points value to be earned. All points were to be tallied up at the end of the weekend to find out which Patrol would be crowned Top Gear Scout for 2019. Needless to say we did our best for first time attendees.



As a leader who went for the first time, the continual discussions that I heard from the scouts over the weekend has led me to believe it was a complete success. 
Special Defibrillator Sponsorship Program – 2018

machine and the bank covered the remainder!


Ken (Assistant Group Leader) and Eric Y (committee office bearer) attended a group presentation of the units in at the bank Business Centre.
